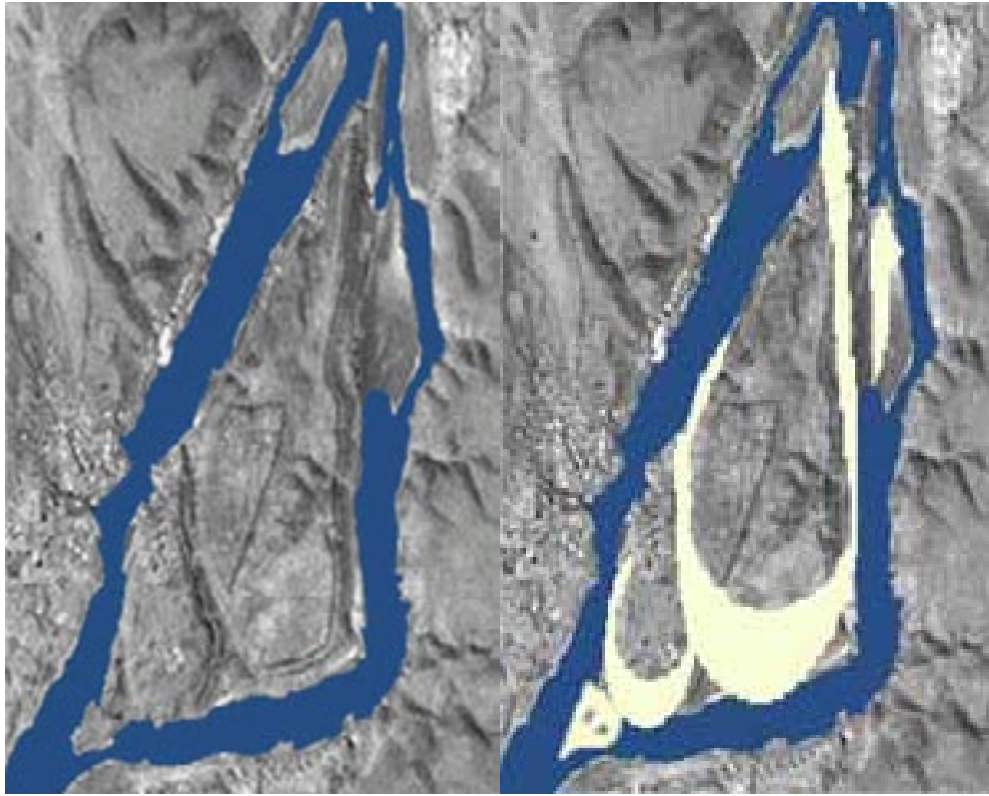


Om and Allah on Common Ground



These satellite images reveal the OM symbol etched into the holy island of Omkara Mandhata. The hillside ranges make up the OM symbol, visible only from above.

The ability to actually view the island of Omkara Mandhata (Omkareshwar) from above and see with our own eyes what scholars have been writing about for centuries is awakening the spirit and faith of many Hindus.

In 2002 with the help from Space Imaging technology, we were able to obtain satellite images of the island Omkara Mandhata that provided the proof that the holy island reveals the sacred Hindu symbol 'OM,' visible only from above.

The island is located 77 km south of Indore on the Narmada River in Madhya Pradesh, India. It draws thousands of devotees daily to one of the 12 Jyotirlinga shrines of Shiva.

The legend is that the Vindhya mountain prayed to Shiva — Omkareshvara — and was blessed here. As the legend goes, upon the request of the Devas, the Shivalinga split into two, one half becoming Omkareshvara and the other Amaleshvara. King Mandhatha of the Ishvaku clan is believed to have worshipped Shiva

here. Govinda Bhagavatpada, the guru of Sankaracharya, is believed to have lived in a cave here, as well as many others like the great philosopher Adi Shankara, who was born in 805 A.D.

We received a letter from Hatim Taj residing in Columbia, Missouri, in May 2002 that brings forth our second revelation or discovery. Allah's name is written by the same hillside ranges that make up the Om symbol.
